### Attendance

# **Iowa Family Support Credential** (information)

Dallas County Public Health with the Maternal Child Health Program went through the Iowa Family Support Credential process. The program had several low scores on a scale of 1-4 and was required to submit a corrective action plan to the IFSTAN coordinator within a 30 day time period. The corrective action plan was submitted on time. The Committee has requested that the corrective action plan be submitted to the 4 R Kids Board and Deb will follow-up. A fidelity review is scheduled for November 17, 2016. Deb receives regular updates from the IFSTAN coordinator and is confident that the program will complete the fidelity review. As a note it is required to either be enrolled in the IFS credential process or have received a IFS credential in order to continue to receive funding from ECI.

# **FY17 Preschool Transportation policy** (action requested)

The FY17 preschool transportation policy was reviewed. The policy had no restriction on the maximum amount of funding allowed per child, but a maximum of \$4.00 a day or 3 miles was added to the policy. It is consensus of the committee to recommend to the Board the revised preschool transportation policy for FY17.

### FY16 Annual Report Review Highlights (information)

The committee reviewed the FY16 financial statements, FY16 annual reports from providers (32 pages), an annual report highlight document (4 pages), trend data, analysis and effectiveness of programs, local and state performance measures, executive summary, and several family support comparison documents. Below are a few overall comments after reviewing the data. A detailed comment document is also attached on the next page.

- It is to be noted that 50% of the school ready funds were expended on family support services.
- All 4 Family Support programs were compared to state data, a few interesting data facts are; the average age of mothers served is 28.0 and the state average is 27.0; the primary language other than English was 27% and the state average was 20%; the percent of families with one of more family members incarcerated was 4% and the state average was 3%. The family support outcome data was comparable with the state data.
- The FY16 financial statements have been reconciled with the fiscal agent. There was \$51,057.53 or 5% of school ready funds and \$859.59 or 1% of early childhood funds carried over into FY16, no more than 20% is allowed to be carried over in either fund.
- Of the FY16 carryover funds, all but \$21,916.68 has been allocated to programs for FY17.
- The ECI director has entered the required data online at grants.gov which is due no later than September 15.

### **FY16 Annual Report Approval** (action requested)

• It is consensus of the committee to recommend approval of the FY2016 annual report, FY2016 Executive Summary, FY2016 school ready and early childhood financial statements. The due date for board approval is no later than September 15, 2016.
