Families who receive a visit (introducory or intital visit) but do not enroll are not entered into RedCap or Vist Tracker. This can account for a difference in reported vists on a monthly basis that are not reported in either the RedCap or Visit Tracker system. The RedCap 3rd quarter data regarding the number of newly enrolled families does not match program data. Program has been reporting to the ECI director new enrollment numbers on a monthly basis. Most waiting list families are from Coordinated Intake referral source. We are making steady progress in taking families off our waiting list, however, we continue to get new referrals, which has offset the families who have been taken off the list. The visits performed are slightly off from what is reported in RedCap - this is due to evaluation visits performed by the Medical Social Worker that do not result in the client being enrolled in the program.

The number of newly enrolled families in our RedCap Report is 39, we reported 44. 1 is a family that was an evaluation only and therefore not reported in RedCap. The other 4 are families that entered our program after 7/1/15 and exited before 1/1/16. DCPHNS looked into this discrepancy and received the following explanation from Julie Tchoumkeu "This is field was calculated by looking at all families enrolled in Q3 only, then of these, looking at families who enrolled July 1, 2015 and later (for the denominator)." Therefore the RedCap report is not turly cumulative, but our number listed above is inclusive of ALL clients enrolled since 7/1/16 - hence the discrepancy.

The number reported here for Coordinated intake referrals will not match up withour monthly reports, as there were 2 referrals made in Q2 that DCPHNS was never able to contact. Those 2 referrals were not appropriately accounted for on our internal reporting spreadsheet. This has been corrected and we will report all Coordinated intake referrals from this point forward.

Trainings offered this year have been heavily on Health and Safety as that is what providers are needing to meet DHS standards. There are new training requirements coming out and providers are trying to plan ahead. I have tried very hard to meet those needs in each of the counties. We have repeated the same class in several of the counties in order for all providers to have the opportunity to attend. We continue to attract providers from outside our four county area. Have had nice feedback from them that they enjoy coming to our trainings and are glad to be able to get classes they do not have in their county. We took a leap of faith and will be holding a higher level STEM class in Adair county this spring. Response has been good, however, the majority of participants signed up are from counties outside our ECI area. The two classes we will hold will be on a Saturday in April with 6 hours of credit available. The classes are presented by a staff member from University of Northern lowa Regent's Center. They are hands on classes and most all participants show a lot of interest in taking practical STEM activities back to their programs and putting them into place. Class participation has been down a little this year, and I contribute that to more on line classes being offered. It is nice for some providers to have that option because of busy lives and time restraints, however, I think many providers still like the live presentations. One challenge for us is that the higer level of classes have increased their prices and it is difficult to keep training costs down. I am thankful for partners in the communities who will offer us space at no cost. We partnered with Lakeshore Learning to offer a great Saturday workshop in March for six hours of training. They provided lunch and incentives for all attendees and also gave us a discounted price on the actual cost of the workshop. The outside evaluation has not yet happened. The Regional Director for our office is continuing to work on the logistics for that contact and s

A few of them at the lower levels of QRS have let their QRS rating with DHS expire, or are working on renewing, but have not yet completed, so DHS does not have them in their system. We have had two participants who are new QRS rated programs and 3 who have increased their scores. We had five new providers this year participate in the grant process; one center, one preschool and three home providers.
