We received 4 new referrals from Maternal Child Health (DCPH) this quarter. We had 5 families enroll from MCH; some had been referred prior to this quarter but their actual enrollment date was within this quarter. Of those 5, 3 were initially given by MCH to LSI New Parent Program (NPP), and then NPP referred them to us when they were not able to enroll them nor put them on their own waiting list. Our waiting list continues to grow every month even though we are enrolling new families regularly. Primarily the waiting list is due to referrals from Shared visions and Coordinated Intake. However, we do have an Educator on a leave of absence until November. Her assigned families are being covered by other Educators. We anticipate that upon her return, we will be able to clear families off of the list more quickly. In addition, we are looking at increasing the caseload of one of the Educators in Dallas County. Referrals are coming in from new sources, as well, so we anticipate that even with increased hours for one Educator and the return of the other, we will continue to have a waiting list throughout the year. At the end of this quarter, we had 25 families on the waiting list. At the time of this writing, DAISEY reports are not available, the deadline for entering quarterly data into DAISEY is the 15th of the month. It is anticipated that the first quarter DAISEY report will be available in the weeks following the 15th. The following story was shared by a Parent Educator: "While on a visit with a family this month, I asked Mom what changes do you see in your son since we started visiting a year ago? She looked at me and said 'Oh my gosh, he is so different. He is talking so much more, he plays games with his father and me, he likes to play with other children inside and out. He participates in our visits. He is asking to go to school and a year ago I would never have imagined him wanting to be out of the house and away from his father or myself. We went to see my family in Chicago this last weekend and my sister said to me, 'what have you done to him? He is like a completely different child, talking and playing with other children, he talks to us (the adults), even a few months ago he wouldn't do that! We are so excited he is so much more outgoing and is learning things so much faster!"

A provider who benefited from the quality improvement grant in Quarter 1 has been a provider off and on for the past few years. After the child care consultant met with the provider last spring to do an information meeting overview, the provider decided this time she would try the ChildNet series since her friends raved about how wonderful it is. While the provider attended the series, the child care consultant met with the provider monthly to break down each module and answer any questions the provider had. Together, the provider and child care consultant reviewed the ChildNet checklist to ensure quality initiatives were in place such as being 100% compliant with the DHS checklist, participating in the Child and Adult Care Food Program, purchasing child care liability insurance, and creating enhanced policies. Once the provider became ChildNet Certified and applied for QRS Level 2, she told the child care consultant, " Wow, you made this such an easy process! My only regret is not doing this sooner!" By having the child care consultant break this process into smaller steps, the provider was able to achieve ChildNet Certifiation, and is now encouraging other providers to follow her steps.

After the grant award was made to us, we learned of new federal child care guidelines for training that impacted classes we offer. All licensed and registered child care providers, plus those providing care for children on Child Care Assistance (CCA) are now required to take a 12 hour health and safety course which for most providers will meet their training requirements for the year with DHS. This was effective in September 2016. Therefore, attendance at classes will lower as only those needing classes to fullfill other obligations such as CACFP or QRS requirements will probably be attending. I have seen the trend in all of the classes we have offered so far. Numbers in attendance have been low and I have cancelled one class already due to lack of enrollment. Once providers have taken the 12 hours series, it will be valid for 5 years. I think this year will show the decrease and it should pick back up next year. I think it is my best interest to lower the benchmark for trainings this year considerably to be fiscally responsible in the use of ECI dollars. The part time staff member under our grant has resigned her position. At this time, we have opted to not replace her due to less time needed to plan and execute trainings and we have made some changes in how we are facilitating our grants which could lower the number of providers receiving grants which in turn could potentially lower the number of provider visits we do.
