As working with a newer, low functioning family that has a 6 month old child, the family started to open up and share more information about the mother and her conflicted relationship w/ her mother. As she talked about how she doesn't get along well w/ her mother or talk to her anymore, she began to explain more about the situation. The parents are aware that the maternal grandmother is dating someone that is a known for sexually abusing children and due to the grandmothers choices right now, they are not allowing her to see their child/her grandchild or allow her to take the child as she has requested. After hearing this, I felt it was extremely important to encourage these parents for making such a huge and vitally important decision, thus affecting his well-being! Educator noted how proud she was of the parents for keeping their child safe and making good decisions about who should and should not be allowed to be around or babysit/care for their child!

Mother involved w/ DHS is working w/ a parent partner and after being given the info about parents as teachers(flyer). The parent took the initiative to contact PAT and sign up for the program vs DHS mandating involvement. Parent states she is working hard to do all that DHS is requesting of her to ensure she gets her child back asap and parent is aware of the fact that she would like some help w/ general parenting as well as another professional's opinion on child language development, as DHS is stating child has developmental delays. Parent states she is also advocating for her child well-being by trying to inform the FSRP worker that child is not feeling well and should have a dr appt scheduled-ended up the child had a double ear infection.

Historically, New Opportunities has been the Title V contractor for Dallas County, and was the leading referral source for our program. When VNS took over the Title V contract, New Opportunities stopped referring to our program for several consecutive months. In response, DCPH and VNS coordinated a meeting with New Opportunities and the State Department of Health to discuss avenues for continued collaboration. We have made much progress in this area and are now receiving referrals from New Opportunities and VNS, however, during this transition, we did not receive as many referrals as usual, which has impacted the total number of new families we have been able to enroll. In response, DCPH has been actively marketing the MCH program, specifically to OB/GYN providers in the eastern Dallas County region to increase enrollment. DCPH also plans to enhance our relationship with Primary Healthcare in Polk County as many of Dallas County's residents use that clinic for prenatal care. Please note that while the number of new families stalled during the Title V contractor transition, we continued to provide service to existing families, providing more frequent and meaningful visits. This allowed us to exceed our benchmark for number of visits.
