The last month has been one of unprecedented change and adaptation for our program. We suspended in-person visits in mid-March, in order to practice social distancing, and canceled our five scheduled group connections. With guidance from our national model and the state, we have transitioned to virtual visits, either through videoconferencing or teleconferencing. Our staff have worked hard to immerse themselves not only in new technology, but in how to adapt in-person visits to a videoconference setting. Educators have driven activity supplies to families' front porches so they could have them for visits. Educators have worked with interpreters to learn three-way videoconferencing, to serve our non-English speaking families. They are learning what practices work to make the visits the best for families.

While we are proud of the work we've done to maintain a continuity of services, there have been some challenges. Not all families have appropriate devices for videoconferencing. Not everyone has wifi or the phone data required to do a visit. Families with prepaid phones have been particularly challenging to visit, virtually. Families are more stressed, trying to work from home, with more children at home, while cooking more food, overseeing educational needs, etc. We are happy that we've been able to be a 'constant' for our families during this time of constant change.

We are also attempting to hire a new Parent Educator. Our timeline will likely be slowed for this process, as our national model has canceled the trainings required for a new Educator to begin.

### Regarding Daisey:

- All information has been entered and is complete. Any fields or reports that look incomplete are imperfections within the system that we cannot control.
- Daisey's count of children is not correct, as it counts children ages birth-six. The number in this report is correct, containing prenatal children, and excluding children who have aged out but not yet turned six.

As in-home providers have become more comfortable with the role of the infant and early childhood mental health consultant they have responded with enthusiasm to the availability of both individual consultation opportunities and the trainings offered on parent-child attachment, provider stress management, and the impact of trauma on infants, young children and their families. In-home providers have requested consultation on a variety of very complex family cases that have involved multiple social, developmental, economic and cultural challenges that have impacted the mental health status of both the parents and children they serve. A CCNC reached out to child care center director in Dallas County, the director expressed concern about several children and staff members out with COVID-19 symptoms, including several infants with a fever over 101. The provider reported that health care providers have not treated or tested the children and/or parents are not taking them in. The director was questioning whether the center is infected with COVID-19. The CCNC and the director discussed the number of children and staff that had been excluded in the past 1-2 weeks and it was determined that there were likely several days with over 10% of children/staff absent due to similar symptoms. The director was allowing children to return to the center prior to the minimum isolation guidelines. The CCNC reached out to both the DHS Center Licensing Consultant, the County Health Department and Healthy Child Care lowa due to potentially over 10% of children/staff excluded due to similar illness symptoms. During these discussions it was determined it would be in the program's best interest to consider a temporary closure of 2-5 days to assist with facility wide disinfection and help to identify potential new cases of illness. The CCNC followed up with the director and was in contact with the owner to discuss concerns, reviewed mitigation strategies, and provided recommendations. As this took place on a Friday, the owner made the decision to close at the end of the day until the following Wednesday. The CCNC contacted the director again to ensure that the center was reopened and discussed measures that took place during the closure and reviewed the center's plans for illness exclusion going forward.
